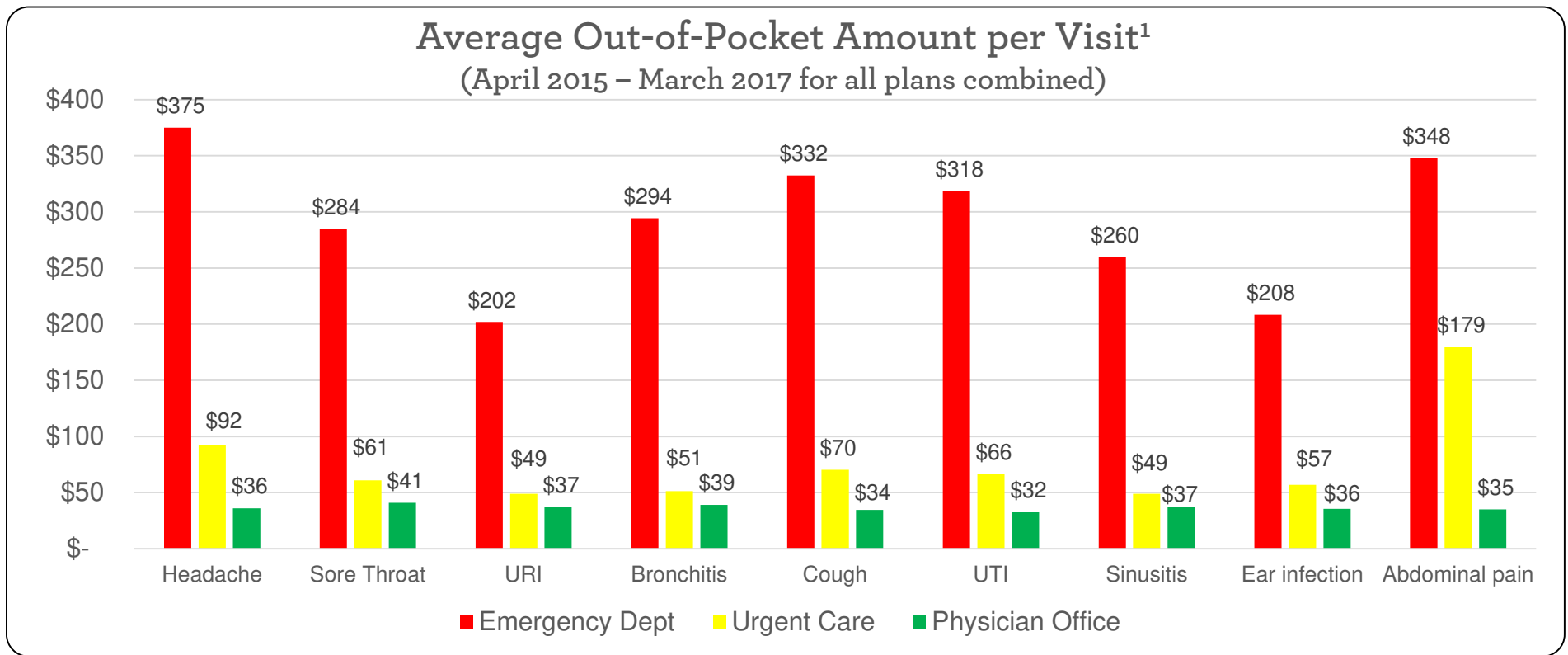

Nausea with vomiting, unspecified	Non-emergent
Syncope and collapse	Emergent
Acute upper respiratory infection, unspecified	Non-emergent
Dizziness and giddiness	Non-emergent
Unspecified injury of head, initial encounter	Emergent
Chest pain NOS	Emergent
Epigastric pain	Non-emergent
Right lower quadrant pain	Non-emergent
Laceration without foreign body of other part of head, initial encounter	Emergent
Acute obstructive laryngitis [croup]	Emergent
Fever, unspecified	Emergent
Noninfective gastroenteritis and colitis, unspecified	Non-emergent
Cough	Non-emergent
Acute pharyngitis, unspecified	Non-emergent
Concussion without loss of consciousness, initial encounter	Emergent
